2012 Show News!

SACXS Members,

I have taken on the responsibility as Show & Sale Manager for 2012. Last year the Show Committee implemented several changes that seemed to help improve the Show and Sale overall. However, the number of participants and plants that are actually displayed during the Show has been declining. We had great response last year with many members helping out during the Show but we need more members showing their plants. One idea I would like to put forward is to ask members to create a small educational display (1/2 of a table or a full table) that would inform the public. Photos, printed information, and some cactus or succulents would create the display. Topics could include: crested cacti/succulents, columnar cacti, Texas succulents, variegated cacti/succulents, succulents of a specific region or country, miniature succulents, caudiciform succulents, or succulents of a specific genus. A second idea would be to have a judged show again but create more divisions that would receive awards such as Best Mammillaria, Best South American Cactus, Best Euphorbia, Best Pachypodium, Best Crested Succulent, etc. Plants would be judged by SACXS members or the public rather than official judges. Certificates to trade in for plants from dealers at the show would be awarded.

I really need some feedback from all members concerning these ideas and a commitment from members to participate in the Show. People come to the Show to see interesting and unusual plants that they can't see anywhere else. Let's not disappoint the public. We want them to keep attending our Show & Sale.
